The German Research Foundation (DFG) In short

Who we are:

- ➤ Central public funding organization for basic research in Germany
- ► A **self-governing body** of science and research
- ► Member organization (universities, academies, research organizations)
- The budget in 2018:
 approx. € 3.4 billion in direct research funding
- provided primarily by the federal government and the 16 German Länder





The German Research Foundation (DFG) Funding Principles

- no regional priorities
- no political priorities
- no political influence
- Funding only if institution agrees on ethical standards



- everything in competition
- everything in peer review




DFG's mission statement

The DFG

- > serves all branches of science and the humanities
- fosters scientific excellence through competition
- supports international cooperation in research
- advises political and social decisionmakers
- supports the transfer of knowledge between science and industry

Funding in 2019, by scientific discipline





Funding Principles

- > Open, bottom-up choice of research topics
- Basic research in any field of science and the humanities
- > No age restrictions
- ➤ Individual **career phases** and family-related career breaks are considered in the review process
- ➤ No deadlines, (almost) no calls*



Eligibility for DFG Funding

Researchers

- who have completed their scientific training (doctorate)
- > from all disciplines
- of any age
- Working (!) in German research institutions





The German Research Foundation (DFG) DFG's funding criteria

DFG reviewers evaluate proposals based on

- projects' scientific merit
- applicants' qualifications
- goals and work program
- proposed use of funding
- If international partners involved: quality and added value of the cooperation

Funding of International Cooperation

All DFG funding programs generally allow the integration of **international components**




DFG support for projects with international partners is generally based on the principle of **mutual responsibility**. Researchers working in Germany apply to the DFG, while their partners abroad apply for funding at their respective partner organizations.

Funding of International Cooperation Initiation of International Collaboration

Initiation of International Collaboration

- ➤ **Mobility funding** to get to know each other
- > establish mutual trust and understanding
- and to prepare a joint project proposal

Modules

- Workshops in Germany or abroad
- > Short individual visits in Germany or abroad
- Visits up to three months in Germany or abroad





Funding of International Cooperation Initiation of International Collaboration



Funding can include

- > Travel costs and daily allowance for travelling to the partner country
- Travel costs and daily allowance for guests in Germany
- > Travel costs and daily allowance for needed specialist(s) from third country

Funding is available for a **maximum of 1 year**

Application by the **German partner university**

- Very lean and easy proposal
- Partner in Germany can in some cases cover costs for international partners



Funding of International CooperationResearch Grant

Research Grant

Purpose

To carry out a thematically defined research project within a specific time frame



Duration

Project-specific (usually three years)

Bilateral cooperation is possible

Details can depend on the region and partner organization

- ➤ For mid-term joint research projects, one partner at each side
- ➤ Both partners apply for funding at their respective national funding agency



Funding of International CooperationResearch Grant



Funding can include

- > **Staff**: PhD-students, post-docs; non-permanent staff
- funding for direct project costs
- Mobility: Travel allowances
- Consumables, scientific instrumentation
- other items such as publications, trial-related expenses, PR activities



Funding of International CooperationScientific Networks

Scientific Networks

Purpose

To promote multi-year scientific exchange and cooperation on a

topic area across locations

Duration

Up to three years

Bilateral cooperation

The network can consist of **10-20 researchers** from Germany and abroad; including researchers from several institutions

Funding of International CooperationScientific Networks



Funding can include

- ➤ Maintenance costs for work meetings
- ➤ **Mobility:** Travel costs for network members or thematically relevant guests
- Publication costs, support for coordinations

- Mid-term network of researchers
- Can be a greenhouse to develop joint projects or keep in touch on a topic

- ▶ DFG accepts proposals from every field at any time
- ► All programs are **open** to international cooperations
- ► There is no specific international budget
- ▶ DFG funds basic research.
- ➤ Your German partner submits the proposal for your joint project.












Average decision times for proposals*


